dick higgins and his something else press epitomized the riotous art of the 60s there are few art world figures as influential and as little known as dick higgins 1938 98 cofounder of fluxus polyartist poet scholar theorist composer performer and not least the publisher of the legendary something else press in 1965 he restored the term intermedia to the english language giving it new dimension to recognize the dissolution of boundaries between traditional modes of art making and the open field for new forms that cannot be compartmentalized his own contributions to intermedia are many as a participant and instigator of happenings as writer and composer straddling traditional and vanguard forms among others but it was something else press 1963 74 that redefined how the book could inhabit that energized in between space something else press was as much a critical statement and radical experiment as it was a collection of books by some of the most luminary artists and writers of the 20th century gertrude stein john cage ray johnson dieter roth bern porter ian hamilton finlay emmett williams robert filliou and george brecht among many others along with his great bear pamphlet series and the something else newsletter higgins exploited and subverted conventional book production and marketing strategies to get unconventional and avant garde works into the hands of new and often unsuspecting readers edited by granary books publisher steve clay and fluxus artist ken friedman this judiciously curated and indispensable compendium of essays theoretical writings and narrative prose dives deep into the ever influential ideas that higgins explored in theory and practice clay and friedman have

chosen works that illuminate higgins voracious intellectual appetite encyclopedic body of knowledge and playful yet rigorous experimentation in a selection that includes many writings long out of print or difficult to find

generation these and the other magazines allen examines expressed their differences from mainstream media in both form and content they cast their homemade do it yourself quality against the slickness of an artforum and they created work that defied the formalist orthodoxy of the day artists magazines featuring abundant color illustrations of magazine covers and content offers an essential guide to a little explored medium

 century harald szeemann 1933 2005 is associated with some of the most important
 artistic developments of the postwar era a passionate advocate for avant garde
 movements like conceptualism and postminimalism he collaborated with artists such as
 joseph beuys bruce nauman richard serra and cy twombly developing new ways of

presenting art that reflected his sweeping vision of contemporary culture szemann once stated that his goal as an exhibition maker was to create a museum of obsessions this richly illustrated volume is a virtual collection catalogue for that imaginary institution tracing the evolution of his curatorial method through letters drawings personal datebooks installation plans artists books posters photographs and handwritten notes this book documents all phases of szemann s career from his early stint as director of the kunsthalle bern where he organized the seminal live in your head when attitudes become form 1969 to documenta 5 1972 and the intensely personal exhibition he staged in his own apart ment using the belongings of his hairdresser grandfather 1974 to his reinvention as a freelance curator who realized projects on wide ranging themes until his death in 2005 the book contains essays exploring szemann s curatorial approach as well as interviews with collaborators its more than 350 illustrations include previously unpublished installation photographs and documents as well as archival materials this volume is published to accompany an exhibition on view at the getty research institute at the getty center february 6 to may 6 2018 a satellite show will be at the institute of contemporary art in los angeles february 4 to april 22 2018 at the kunsthalle bern in bern switzerland june to september 2018 at the kunsthalle düsseldorf in düsseldorf germany october 2018 to january 2019 and at the castello di rivoli museo d arte contemporanea rivoli in turin italy february to may 2019

perhaps the most enigmatic cultural artifacts that survive from the anglo saxon period are the old english riddle poems that were preserved in the tenth century exeter book manuscript clever challenging and notoriously obscure the riddles have fascinated readers for centuries and provided crucial insight into the period in say what i am called dieter bitterli takes a fresh look at the riddles by examining them in the context of earlier anglo latin riddles bitterli argues that there is a vigorous common tradition between anglo latin and old english riddles and details how the contents of the exeter book emulate and reassess their latin predecessors while also expanding their literary and formal conventions the book also considers the ways in which convention and content relate to writing in a vernacular language a rich and illuminating work that is as intriguing as the riddles themselves say what i am called is a rewarding study of some of the most interesting works from the anglo saxon period

noise music looks at the phenomenon of noise in music from experimental music of the early 20th century to the japanese noise music and glitch electronica of today it situates different musics in their cultural and historical context and analyses them in terms of cultural aesthetics paul hegarty argues that noise is a judgement about sound that what was noise can become acceptable as music and that in many ways the idea of noise is similar to the idea of the avant garde while it provides an excellent historical overview the book s main concern is in the noise music that has emerged since the mid 1970s whether through industrial music punk free jazz or the purer noise of someone like merzbow the book progresses seamlessly from discussions of john cage erik satie and pauline oliveros through to bands like throbbing gristle and the boredom sharp and erudite and underpinned throughout by the ideas of thinkers like adorno and deleuze noise music is the perfect primer for anyone interested in the louder side of experimental music

well known art historians from europe and the americas discuss the influence of conceptualism on art since the 1970s art after conceptual art tracks the various legacies of conceptualist practice over the past three decades this collection of essays by art historians from europe and the americas introduces and develops the idea that conceptual art generated several different and even contradictory forms of art practice some of these contested commonplace assumptions of what art is others served to buttress those assumptions the bulk of the volume features newly written and highly

Types of Smoke and Their Sources

Smoke isn't a monolithic entity; it comes in diverse forms, each with its own characteristics: Wood Smoke: Produced by burning wood, it's characterized by a distinctive smell and often contains higher levels of particulate matter, including creosote. This type of smoke is a significant contributor to air pollution in areas with wood-burning stoves or fireplaces. Coal Smoke: From burning coal, this smoke is

typically darker and denser due to higher carbon content. Historically a major source of air pollution, its use is declining in many countries due to environmental concerns.

Cigarette Smoke: A complex mixture of over 7,000 chemicals, including numerous carcinogens and toxins, it's a major public health concern. Its particulate matter can

irritate the respiratory system and contribute to cardiovascular disease. **Vehicle Exhaust:**

While not always visibly smoky, vehicle exhaust contains particulate matter and various harmful gases like NO_x and CO. Modern vehicles have emission control systems to

minimize these pollutants. **Industrial Smoke:** This category encompasses smoke from various industrial processes, including manufacturing, power generation, and waste

incineration. Its composition is highly variable and can include a wide array of

hazardous substances. **Wildfire Smoke:** This is a particularly dangerous type of smoke, often containing high levels of particulate matter and toxic gases. Wildfires can release

massive amounts of smoke, causing widespread air pollution and posing significant health risks.
