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in this interdisciplinary collection of essays joel w martin and mark a nicholas gather emerging and leading voices in the study of native american religion to reconsider the complex and often misunderstood history of native peoples engagement with christianity and with euro american missionaries surveying mission encounters from contact through the mid nineteenth century the volume alters and enriches our understanding of both american christianity and indigenous religion the essays here explore a variety of postcontact identities including indigenous christians mission friendly non christians and ex christians thereby exploring the shifting world of native white cultural and religious exchange rather than questioning the authenticity of native christian experiences these scholars reveal how indigenous peoples negotiated change with regard to missions missionaries and christianity this collection challenges the pervasive stereotype of native americans as culturally static and ill equipped to

for native americans religious freedom has been an elusive goal from nineteenth century bans on indigenous ceremonial practices to twenty first century legal battles over sacred lands peyote use and hunting practices the u s government has often act presents the history of the native american religions starting from their roots as tribal religions and then details the detrimental effects of european colonization the annihilation of the native americans that threatened the religions and their restoration in the 20th 20th century

native americans practice some of america s most spiritually profound historically resilient and ethically demanding religions joel martin draws his narrative from folk stories rituals and even landscapes to trace the development of native american religion from ancient burial mounds through interactions with european conquerors and missionaries and on to the modern day rebirth of ancient rites and beliefs the book depicts the major cornerstones of american indian history and religion the vast movements for pan indian renewal the formation of the native american church in 1919 the passage of the native american graves and repatriation act of 1990 and key political actions involving sacred sites in the 1980s and 90s martin explores the close links between religion and native american culture and history legendary chiefs like osceola and tecumseh led their tribes in resistance movements against the european invaders inspired by prophets like the shawnee tenskwatawa and the mohawk cocoochee catharine brown herself a convert founded a school for cherokee women and converted dozens of her people to christianity their stories along with those of dozens of other men and women from noble warriors to celebrated authors are masterfully woven into this vivid wide ranging survey of native american history and religion religion in american life explores the evolution character and dynamics of organized religion in america from 1500 to the present day written by distinguished religious historians these books weave together the varying stories that compose the

in 2016 thousands of people travelled to north dakota to camp out near the standing rock sioux reservation to protest the construction of an oil pipeline that is projected to cross underneath the missouri river a half mile upstream from the reservation the standing rock sioux consider the pipeline a threat to the region s clean water and to the sioux s sacred sites such as its ancient burial grounds the encamped protests garnered front page headlines and international attention and the resolve of the protesters was made clear in a red banner that flew above the camp defend the sacred what does it mean when native communities and their allies make such claims what is the history of such claim making and why has this rhetorical and legal strategy based on appeals to religious freedom failed to gain much traction in american courts as michael mcnelly recounts in this book native americans have repeatedly been inspired to assert claims to sacred places practices objects knowledge and ancestral remains by appealing to the discourse of religious freedom but such claims based on alleged violations of the first amendment free exercise of religion clause of the us constitution have met with little success in us courts largely because native american communal traditions have been difficult to capture by the modern western category of religion in light of this poor track record native communities have gone beyond religious freedom based legal strategies in articulating their sacred claims in e g the technocratic language of cultural resource under american environmental and historic preservation law in terms of the limited sovereignty accorded to native tribes under federal indian law and increasingly in the political language of indigenous rights according to international human rights law especially in light of the 2007 u n declaration of the rights of indigenous peoples and yet the language of religious freedom which resonates powerfully in the us continues to be deployed propelling some remarkably useful legislative and administrative accommodations such as the 1990 native american graves protection and reparation act as mcnelly s book shows native communities draw on the continued rhetorical power of religious freedom language to attain legislative and regulatory victories

beyond the first amendment

representative native american religions and rituals are introduced to readers in a way that respects the individual traditions as more than local curiosities or exotic rituals capturing the flavor of the living modern traditions even as commonalities between and among traditions are explored and explained this general introduction offers wide ranging coverage of the major factors geography history religious behavior and religious ideology theology analyzing select traditions that can be dealt with to varying degrees on a contemporary basis as current interest surrounding native american studies continues to grow attention has often been given to the various religious beliefs rituals and customs of the diverse traditions across the country but most treatments of the subject are cursory and encyclopedic and do not provide readers with the flavor of the living modern traditions here representative native american religions and rituals are introduced to readers in a way that respects the individual traditions as more than local curiosities or exotic rituals even as commonalities between and among traditions are explored and explained this general introduction offers wide ranging coverage of the major factors geography history religious behavior and religious ideology theology analyzing select traditions that can be dealt with to varying degrees on a contemporary basis covering such diverse ceremonies as the muskogee creek busk the northwest coast potlatch the navajo and apache menarche rituals and the anishnabe great lakes area midewiwin seasonal gatherings paper takes a comparative approach based on the study of human religion in general and the special place of native american religions within it his book is informed by perspective gained through nearly fifty years of formal study and several decades of personal involvement treating readers to a glimpse of the living religious traditions of native american communities across the country

what it means to be healthy or to heal is not universal from culture to culture from religion to religion indeed in many cultures religion and healing are intimately tied to each other in native american communities healing is conceived as the place where ideas about the body and selfhood are brought to light and expressed within healing traditions healing is defined as self making and illness as whatever compromises one

s ability to be oneself this book explores religion and healing in native america emphasizing the lived experience of indigenous religious practices and their role in health and healing indigenous traditions of healing in north america emphasize that the healthy self is defined by its relationship with its human spiritual and ecological communities here crawford brings together first hand accounts personal experience and narrative observations of native american religion and healing to present a richly textured portrait of the intersection of tradition cultural revival spirituality ceremony and healing these are not descriptions of traditions isolated from their historical cultural and social context but intimately located within the communities from which they come these portraits range from discussions of pre colonial healing traditions to examples where traditional approaches exist along with other cultural traditions both native and non native at the heart of all the essays is a concern for the ways in which diverse native communities have understood what it means to be healthy and the role of spirituality in achieving wellness readers will come away with a better understanding not just of religion and healing in native american communities but of native american communities in general and how they live their lives on an everyday basis

despite challenges by the federal government to restrict the use of peyote the native american church which uses the hallucinogenic cactus as a religious sacrament has become the largest indigenous denomination among american indians today the peyote road examines the history of the nac including its legal struggles to defend the controversial use of peyote thomas c maroukis has conducted extensive interviews with nac members and leaders to craft an authoritative account of the church s history diverse religious practices and significant people his book integrates a narrative history of the peyote faith with analysis of its religious beliefs and practices as well as its art and music and an emphasis on the views of nac members deftly blending oral histories and legal research maroukis traces the religion s history from its mesoamerican roots to the legal incorporation of the nac its expansion to the northern plains great basin and southwest and challenges to peyotism by state and federal governments including the supreme court decision in oregon v smith he also introduces readers to the inner workings of the nac with descriptions of its organizational structure and the cross fire and half moon services the peyote road

updates omer stewart s classic 1987 study of the peyote religion by taking into consideration recent events and scholarship in particular maroukis discusses not only the church s current legal issues but also the diminishing peyote supply and controversies surrounding the definition of membership today approximately 300 000 american indians are members of the native american church the peyote road marks a significant case study of first amendment rights and deepens our understanding of the struggles of nac members to practice their faith
